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Recipe of the Month

Herbed Turkey Roll

1 6-lb turkey breast, skin and bone removed
½ tsp dried rosemary, crumbled
½ tsp dried oregano
½ tsp dried thyme
¼ tsp garlic powder
salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350° .

Using a sharp knife, make a lengthwise slit in the turkey breast, as if creating a pocket. Do not cut all the way through. Open at the pocket and lay flat.

Place turkey between 2 pieces of wax paper. Flatten with a mallet to about 1-1/2 inches thick.

Sprinkle spices evenly over turkey.

Starting at one end, roll turkey like a jelly roll. Tie with cord in 3 or 4 places.

Wrap turkey securely in aluminum foil and place in a shallow baking pan.

Bake 2 hours. Makes 12 to 14 servings. Leftovers make great sandwiches.

Pumpkin Custard Cups

1 pkg orange-flavored gelatin (sugar-free)
¾ c boiling water
½ c part-skim ricotta cheese
1 c canned pumpkin
1 tsp vanilla extract
½ tsp ground cinnamon

In a small saucepan, dissolve gelatin in boiling water.

In a blender container, combine gelatin mixture with remaining ingredients. Blend until smooth.

Divide mixture evenly into 4 individual bowls or sherbet glasses.

Chill until firm.

This dessert is moist and cheesecake-like, and doubling the recipe will fill a 9-inch pie crust.
